Course Description

This course is designed to provide each music education major with more advanced skills and knowledge necessary to instruct beginning and intermediate students in brass instrument performance and pedagogy. It will also assist each student in attaining a basic level of performance on various brass instruments, in most cases the French horn and the tuba/baritone, with an emphasis on characteristic tone and technique development. Each student shall be provided with an intermediate understanding of the repertoire and performance demands of each of the five major brass instruments.

Prerequisites

Students must have passed MUSC 123A with a grade of a C or better to enroll in this class. While students in MUSC123B will be learning different instruments from in MUSC123A, it will be necessary that they already know the basics of how to produce a characteristic sound on any brass instrument.

Course Goals and Student Learning Objectives

1. Obtain a basic level of performance on two brass instruments not previously studied, as assigned by the instructor, in most cases the French horn and the tuba or baritone. This will include being able to perform:

- i. Major scales up to three sharps and three flats, performed legato and tongued at a quarter = 90.
 - ii. Chromatic scale over the range of the instrument.
 - iii. Exercises/pieces as assigned for each class.
2. Know at an intermediate level about production techniques on the brass instruments, and how to teach these to students.
3. Learn at an intermediate level about the technical difficulties specific to each brass instrument, and exercises to help overcome them.
4. Know about the repertoire suitable to various levels of brass playing, and of recordings to be played to students.
5. Be able to communicate clearly, knowledgably and effectively to students.

Course Content Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Perform to a proficient standard intermediate level scales, solo works and technical exercises on the two brass instruments assigned to them.
2. Start a beginner student on a brass instrument with clarity and confidence.
3. Show an intermediate knowledge of the technical difficulties specific to brass instruments, and be able to know how to help their own students tackle these issues.
4. Show a more specific knowledge of the various brass instruments that exist, the advantages/disadvantages of these instruments, and when they should be used.
5. Show an advanced knowledge of how the brass instruments should be used within an ensemble.
6. Select appropriate instruments for their own students/ music program.

Required Texts/Readings

Other equipment / material requirements

Tuning slide grease, valve oil, water spray bottle for trombone slide, trombone slide grease.

Classroom Protocol

Students are expected to take part in class discussions, ask questions, and assist fellow students when possible. Students are expected to attend all classes on time, and when the class is scheduled as an instrumental instruction class, students must bring the assigned instrument, and have it out, oiled and greased as necessary, and be ready to play, unless otherwise instructed.

NOTEBOOKS

Each student is expected to keep a notebook of all handouts, class notes, papers, and other designated information. This notebook is to serve as a reference for future brass classes or when the student enters his/her career.

The title page should include the student's name, the date, and the class (Brass Fundamentals). There should be a table of contents including the course syllabus, general information, horn, trumpet, trombone, baritone/euphonium/tuba, and exams, assignments, quizzes. In the notebook should be included all class hand-outs, and all class notes, neatly organized. Labeled dividers should be used to separate sections of the notebook. Materials from MUSC123A and MUSC125B are expected to be in this notebook.

Notebooks are due: **Wednesday, April 29**. No late notebooks will be accepted. They will be returned Monday May 4, in preparation for the final exam. If you wish to have it returned sooner than this, please advise me.

REPORTS

Four articles per instrument played this semester, on some aspect of teaching these instruments, for a total of 8. These articles must not be more than 2 by the same writer.

1. Summarize the important points of the article in a 1-2 page report (at least 1 full page, 12 point Times Roman, double spaced.)
2. Include full bibliographical citation at the top of the first page, including the date that the article was first written. If the article is contained within a collection of articles, such as the Brass Anthology, make sure that the date given is that of when the article was written, in addition to when the anthology was published.
3. Comment on what you found most useful about the article, how will it benefit your teaching?
4. Do not merely 'cut and paste' from the article – the reports must be presented in your own words.
5. Articles can be found in the *Brass Anthology* in the library, the *Instrumentalist* and the *Brass Bulletin* found in the periodical section of the library (lower level). Internet articles can be used as long as they are fully cited and are complete discussions of a certain pedagogical aspect of brass. Choose your articles carefully, and do not submit more than 2 articles written by the same author, particularly if found on the internet.

The first 4 reports are due **Monday, March 16.**

The final 4 reports are due **Monday, May 4.** No late reports will be accepted.

PROFICIENCY EXAMS

The specific requirements for these will be set out in the weeks before the exams. They will be performed on brass instruments as assigned.

TEACHING PRACTICE ASSIGNMENT

Students will teach a 15 minute lesson to a beginner brass player, in front of the class. Students must arrange for a person who has **never** played a brass instrument before to receive this lesson. This will happen during the final exam period, on **Tuesday May 19** from 9:45am-12:00. This assignment is to reflect what you have learned over the combined semesters of MUSC123A and 123B. Make sure you review materials from class for starting a beginner, and prepare thoroughly – a lesson plan needs to be completed, although this does not need to be submitted.

FINAL EXAM

A final written exam will be taken on **Wednesday, May 6,** during the third last class period for the semester.

MAKEUP EXAMS

If students have a written medical excuse for missing an exam, a makeup exam will be given within a week of the missed exam or, at the discretion of the instructor, during the final makeup period. If students do not have a written medical excuse, the student will receive a zero for the missed exam.
